David Arevalo is a Texas born, Mexican, costume maker, designer, educator and artist. His work straddles the intersections of embodied and cultural knowledge, classical and contemporary techniques of garment making and visual storytelling via material sculpture. The transformation and elevation of ideas, objects and expectations is central to his practice. He has worked as a draper/tailor at the Santa Fe Opera, for Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Fulton Theatre and Merrimack Repertory Theatre, among others. He has taught courses in costume technology at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and in design and material storytelling at Northwestern University. His costuming work was featured in *Unbuttoned: The Art and Artists of Theatrical Costume Design*, and his artistic work, a material storytelling sculpture titled *Raza Cósmica*, was featured in *American Theatre magazine*. He is a first generation college graduate from San Antonio, Texas, with a B.A. from The University of Texas at Austin and an M.F.A. in Stage Design from Northwestern University. Raquel Barreto is a Brazilian-born costume designer and educator with a love for telling stories that are unexpected, challenging, and beautiful. She has designed for a wide variety of companies and venues, with a focus on developing new works and reinventing classic narratives, often centering around the Latinx experience. Designs include five seasons at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Off-Broadway at Theatre for a New Audience, and multiple regional credits at the Guthrie Theater, the Alley Theatre, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Syracuse Stage, Center Theatre Group, Pasadena Playhouse, Denver Center, South Coast Repertory,

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Arena Stage, Berkeley Rep, Portland Center Stage, California Shakespeare Theater, Cornerstone, the Latino Theater Company, Magic Theatre SF, Campo Santo, Cutting Ball Theater, The Joyce Theater NY, Los Angeles Philharmonic, and Jacob's Pillow Festival, among others. Barreto holds an M.F.A. in Costume Design from the University of California, San Diego and a B.A. in Dramatic Art from the University of California, Berkeley. Her teaching and research interests focus on representation, cultural dialogues of the performing body, sustainable design practices, and de-centered and interdisciplinary approaches to costume history. Award winning scenic designer Josafath Reynoso was born in Mexico and was awarded the Gold Medal for Scenic Design at the World Stage Design 2017 in Taiwan for his production of Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. The 2015 USITT Scenic Design Award; 2014 SETC Scenic Design Award for Eugene O'Neill's The Hairy Ape; the 2013 BroadwayWorld Award for Our Country's Good, and the SETC Ready-for-Work Award for The Threepenny Opera.

In the US, he has designed for Virginia Stage Company, Lexington Children's Theatre, The Clarence Brown Theatre, Serenbe Playhouse, Warehouse Theatre, Triad Stage, Alice Jepson Theatre, Donald Bedell Performance Hall, and University of Tennessee Opera. In Mexico, he has designed for Teatro Salvador Novo, Foro Antonio Lopez Mancera, UNAM Facultad de Arquitectura, and Teatro Esperanza Iris. International credits include new productions for Teatro del Borde in Argentina, Escena 8 in Venezuela, and KCDC in Israel.

He was selected as a keynote speaker for Stage|Set|Scenery in Berlin and invited to present at the International Biennale of Architecture in Buenos Aires for his design of Noche Arabe. He has represented the United States in Germany and The Czech Republic, and he has represented Mexico in Taiwan, The Czech Republic, and Venezuela.

Rusty Cloyes is the vice-regional representative for the Western region of the Stage Managers' Association. He resides in Austin, Texas and regularly stage manages for SXSW and ZACH Theatre, the longest continuously running theater company in Texas. Before coming to Austin, Cloyes was an associate production manager at the American Repertory Theatre (ART) in Cambridge, MA. Prior to ART, he served as the assistant production manager at the Fox

Theatre in Atlanta, a historic 4,500 seat theatre presenting entertainment acts from Broadway tours to musical concerts and everything in between.

Before turning to Production Management, Cloyes served as a professional stage manager in Seattle with various companies including Seattle Repertory Theatre, the Seattle Children's Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, the Intiman Theatre, the Village Theatre and the Seattle Shakespeare Company.

Cloyes received his M.F.A. in Theatre Production from The University of Texas at Austin. He is a member of the Stage Managers' Association, Actor's Equity Association and the United States Institute for Theatre Technology.
